- Improve social work recruitment and retention to meet the current and future workforce requirements of local authorities; particularly focused on retaining social workers in the 2-5 year post-qualifying period;
- Improve the public perception of social work, promote and encourage awareness of the value of the social work

- CPD Plan meeting BASW PCF


